

Sheila entered school in St. Louis and soon showed her true academic colors. She was an apt scholar and earned high marks in most of her endeavors.



Barbara Dad Sheila Gail Mom Lynn








For the remainer of her undergraduate education, Sheila re-joined the family to attend San Diego State, receiving a BA and a MA in physical education, as well as her teaching credentials.



Boat's Crew Tired, Late, But Elated

You might wonder if Monroe Wightman would have any trouble lining up another crew for his next Pacific cruise.

After all, his most recent voyage from Hawaii to San Diego in the stout English-built cutter Armorel didn't follow the script for an easy crossing.

First, there was too little wind and then three storms battered the 40-foot boat. A gear failure threatened to dismast the vessel and the batteries went dead, knocking out the Armorel's radio and engine.

Under sail alone, they struggled against unfavorable winds as they neared the West Coast, finally making landfall at Santa Barbara where the engine was fixed, according to Wightman, 55, a Silver Gate Yacht Club member who brought the vessel into a berth at the Shelter Island club late Wednesday night.

Two Jobs Affected

And as a result of the much longer than expected voyage, one of the crew, an El Cajon schoolteacher, was two weeks late for her job. Another, Charles Tragessor, a San Diego machinist, ended up losing his job.

But Wightman might not have to look any farther than his old crew when he decides to go to sea gain.

All of them said they feel the voyage was the chance of a lifetime.

"It was worth every bit of

it," grimned Tragessor yesterday right after finding out he'd lost his job. Tragessor lives aboard the 36-foot ketch Golden Hind with his family at Silver Gate.

"We jumped at the chance," said Miss Sheila DeWoskin of 8421 Bashan Lake Ave., San Diego, She's the schoolteacher who sailed aboard the Armondel with her San Diego roommate, Miss Rossi Newton.

Voyage Called Exciting

"It was our first long voyage, and it was very exciting."

Wightman said they covered 3,160 miles and they didn't really run into any big problems along the way. His wife, Olga, was the fifth crew member aboard.

"It just took a lot longer than we had thought," noted wightman, who was delivering the vessel to San Dieso for her owner, singer Glen Yarbrough. Yarbrough lives in the Los Angeles area and has had the boat in Hawaii for the past five years.

The Armorel's a big, roomy boat that has a full keel and carries two tons of inside ballast, he said. The boat sleeps five comfortably in her forward cabin, main salon and aft cabin.

Sheila continued to teach for various schools within the Grossmont School District over the next 13 years. She eventually met and fell in love with Mary Spall, and on October 12, 1973 they held a life commitment ceremony together. They moved to a 20-acre ranch in Aguanga, CA, still within San Diego County, where Sheila taught in a one-room schoolhouse and Mary drove the school bus.






